

DROP SAW

SAFE OPERATING PROCEDURE

Do not use this equipment unless you have been properly trained and instructed in its safe use and have been given prior permission.

PRE-OPERATIONAL SAFETY CHECKS:

- 1. The task (e.g. Drawings, Instructions, Specifications etc.) is clearly understood.
- 2. Ensure all guards are securely fitted in the right place. Do not operate a drop saw if guards are missing or faulty.
- 3. Ensure the saw is securely fixed to a work table with bolts or clamps.
- 4. Ensure the drop saw is operated on a RCD provided circuit.
- 5. Examine power lead and plug for any visible damage.
- 6. Ensure the worktable is clean and unobstructed from tools, timber off-cuts and sawdust.
- 7. Ensure that workspace is clear fo any trip hazards.
- 8. Ensure the appropriate blade is being used for the task.
- 9. Ensure the dust extraction system is in good working order, switch the unit on before using the drop saw.
- 10. Never use a faulty drop saw, always report suspected faulty equipment to the supervisor.

DROP SAW

SAFE OPERATING PROCEDURE

OPERATIONAL SAFETY CHECKS:

- 1. Ensure any required adjustments are made to the saw before making a cut or turning on the saw.
- 2. Use clamps to secure the work piece. Do not use a length stop on the scrap end of a secured work piece.
- 3. Before turning on the saw, perform a dry run of the cut to ensure the saw runs true and does not wobble.
- 4. Keep hands clear of the work piece and away from the rotating blade.
- 5. After making a cut, release the switch, hold the saw arm down and wait for the blade to come to a complete stop before removing the work piece or off-cut piece.
- 6. Disconnect the plug from the power source before making any adjustments.
- 7. Back the saw out frequently when making deep cuts to clean and allow the blade to cool.
- 8. Do not exceed the maximum cut of the machine being operated.
- 9. Cut only one workpiece at a time.

HOUSE KEEPING

- 1. Switch off saw and disconnect from power source before removing waste material.
- 2. Leave the machine in a safe, clean and tidy state and ensure good housekeeping practices are in place to minimise dust build up.

POTENTIAL HAZARDS

- Saw may grab and 'kick-back' toward the operator.
- Flying chips and airborne dust.
- · Contact with rotating blade.
- Eye injuries.
- · Noise.
